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Partnership for the future

Board implements Nurse-Family Partnership program

In December, the Santa Cruz County Board of Supervisors voted to implement the Nurse-Family Partnership program, a nationally-renowned, evidence-based effort to match Public Health Nurses with low-income, first time mothers.

Under the program, nurses would make home visits with approximately 100 mothers, beginning during pregnancy and continuing through the critical first years of life. Nurses help new mothers become knowledgeable parents able to better prepare children for successful futures.

"Supporting mothers and kids in these critical years is essential," said Supervisor Ryan Coonerty, who advocated for the Nurse-Family Partnership program after learning about it at a White House Conference on Innovation in Government. "The data shows the Nurse-Family Partnership program is one of the best investments we can make to benefit kids, children, families and the community."

"I am pleased to have worked with Supervisor Coonerty to implement this important program," Health Services Agency Director Giang Nguyen said. "We worked tirelessly with the local medical community to provide funding for the Nurse-Family Partnership. Because everyone worked together, we can make a difference in the lives of local children."

Founded in Elmira, N.Y. in 1977, Nurse-Family Partnerships are now in place in eight countries and 43 U.S. states. Santa Cruz County is the 23rd county in California to implement the program, which helps reduce childhood illness and injuries, increase school readiness, decrease subsequent pregnancies and increase maternal employment. These outcomes also have been shown to reduce long-term health care, education and criminal justice expenditures.

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Deal reached on Parks Service Officers for San Vicente Redwoods

The County of Santa Cruz, Peninsula Open Space Trust, Sempervirens Fund and the Land Trust of Santa Cruz County have reached a preliminary agree-



ment on a three-year pilot program to facilitate public safety and access to the 8,500-acre San Vicente Redwoods property.

The proposal would provide for three personnel through the County's Department of Parks, Open Space and Cultural Services to protect natural resources, enhance the visitor experience and mitigate neighborhood impacts. POST, Sempervirens and the Land Trust would assume the costs of the program.

"This proposal offers a tremendous opportunity for the County to provide public services on a very large open space property on the North Coast at no County expense," Supervisor Ryan Coonerty said.

"This is a great partnership between government and conservation groups to protect nature and provide public access," said Stephan Slade, executive director of the Land Trust of Santa Cruz County.

Owned by POST and Sempervirens, the San Vicente Redwoods property is the largest privately-owned parcel in Santa Cruz County and one of the largest in California. A community-based public access plan that include opportunities for recreation, research and education is being developed by the Land Trust of Santa Cruz County, with initial public access expected in 2018.

Presidential election smooth for County Elections Department

To those who followed it, the 2016 presidential race was anything but smooth. But hundreds of volunteers helped Election Day run well in Santa Cruz County.

County Clerk Gail Pellerin and her staff helped manage 132,165 votes a new record — in Santa Cruz Coun-



ty, including more than 83,000 who voted by mail. Voters elected new representatives across the county, passed school bonds in Santa Cruz and Soquel, weighed in on 13 state propositions and approved Measure D, the countywide transportation sales tax.
